


#### **Proven Success:**

- 43% nonfiction texts




# TR Book Room Materials

# TR Leader in Me—Progress

- Continued focus on leadership of all students in the school
- Academic goals now incorporated to promote leadership and responsibility in students' own learning
- Wildly Important Goals (WIGs)—
  were set for all students to become better
  readers with a goal of 85% of students knowing
  their letters, sounds and sight words by 2019
- Teaching responsibility, ownership of one's own learning, and setting goals has created a culture of high expectations and academic importance

## Lucy Calkins-Writing Workshop

#### **Writing Workshop Pilot**

- Mrs. Knaub's 4<sup>th</sup> Grade classroom piloted the Writing Workshop this year
- Her classroom held a "Book Store"--teachers and members of the administrative team visited to see their narrative writing pieces and learn about the writing process
- Later in the year, students researched the American Revolution and wrote essays about what they learned
- Next year, more teachers are joining the Writing Workshop pilot.






## Lucy Calkins-Continued Challenging Work

## JFK Middle School

#### **Technology/STEM Progress**

- Partnership with Lancaster Central School District—Expert STEM teacher works as a consultant assisting us with the creation of new curriculum/innovative ideas
- In grades 6-8, students now experience improved technology education---coding & a multi-disciplinary unit on rockets (math and science connection)





## JFK MS—STEM Rocket Launching

#### **STEM Progress Continued**

- Science, Technology, Engineering and Math are incorporated into every project
  - When students launched their rockets, they recorded flight time and the angle from a given base point
- With the information and help of Mr. Miller (8th grade math teacher), they calculated the height of the rockets
- In Science, Mr. Hewitt showed students how to calculate the feet per second

## **Technology Education Continued**

#### 2019 STEM Field Trip to Gates Vascular Center

- On March 22, 2019, students from JFK (8-12) visited the Gates Vascular Institute for JFK's first Biomedical STEM field trip

## Technology Education—Hands-On

#### Science, Math & Technology Exposure

## JFK MS—RECESS

#### Recess

- Research--healthy minds and time devoted to social opportunities (recess) lead to greater academic and social/emotional success
- 2018-19--first year that all JFK MS students participate in daily recess
- Data shows—the addition of recess has led to a reduction of over 50% in discipline referrals after lunch



## JFK MS—College Focus & Exposure

#### **Buffalo State College**

- On May 6<sup>th</sup>, 8th graders visited Buffalo State College for the 6th annual field trip
- Students participated in a campus tour and learned from admissions counselors about college entrance criteria
- The partnership with Buffalo State College recently fully funded a Cultural Awareness Day on May 3<sup>rd</sup>, with presenters from many different cultural organizations in WNY





## JFK HS Positive Change for 2019-2020

## **Master Schedule Improvements**

- Formed a Committee of High School Teachers and Mrs.
   Finn to represent every department
- Read a book on scheduling—used as a guide
- Brainstormed needs of JFK High School
- Focused on need for advisement period, length of lunches,
   clear student expectations, and development of classes

## Positive Change at JFK HS--Continued

#### **Master Schedule Improvements**

- Periods—Reduced from 43 to 41 minutes—used those minutes to create Advisement Periods
- Lunches—length reduced from 43 to 30 minutes
- Creation of 2 new courses:
  - 1. **CFM**—required Freshman course to build organizational skills and leadership skills and to integrate the 7 Habits/Leader in Me content
  - 2. Animation Course—art/technology
- Art Courses will now be a ½ year to allow more flexibility
- English Course—designed to assist struggling students
- **ALC**—2 teachers present per period (one math teacher)

## JFK HS Technology/STEM Focus

#### **TECHNICAL GRAPHICS 1 (CAD 1)**

- JFK Competed at the Association for Bridge Construction & Design Bridge Contest
- 10th Grader, Hieu Hoang, placed 65th out of 100 entries--he had an engineering and design score of 17 out of a possible 18 points
- 10th Grader, Jonathan Vu, had a perfect engineering score of 18 points

## 21st Century Learning

- Students are using the new VEX Robotics Kits
- Students are applying what was learned as they compete in a cone stacking relay race



### JFK HS—Partners with our MS Students

#### 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Students Visit JFK HS

- 7th and 8th graders--visited the High School Technology classes
- Mr. Schmidt explains the available courses that are offered to our students—encouraging interest in the area of STEM


## **Progress in our ALC**

- As of the end of April--13,457 students have utilized the ALC
- These include scheduled and non scheduled students
- This is an increase of 300 students from the previous year
- 75% of students who were scheduled in the ALC for Regents preparation for mathematics passed their exam in January 2019!
- One student took the Algebra 1 Regents exam 5 times before he was scheduled in the ALC for test prep. He studied from September to January and finally passed on his next try!


#### **ALC Progress Continued**


- So far this year, 700 students have stayed after school in the ALC to work on their academics

• Record keeping (Student Binders) keeps students on track










The LEAD Team's primary responsibility is to fulfill The 4 Roles of Great Leaders

- **Pathfinding** to establish the path our school should take, **aligning** in pursuit of that path, **empowering** others, and **modeling**

#### **Coming Soon!**

Our Leadership Day is scheduled on Friday May 24<sup>th</sup> Theme is "Sharpen the Saw"

- The PTO has sponsored a guest speaker, Steve Procknal (AKA Yoga Steve) to speak about overcoming challenges and keeping a positive mindset in order to lift others up
- Yoga Steve will also teach 2 yoga classes
- Every student has selected from 5 types of activities and has been scheduled in 1 to 2 sessions of 12 organized activities that will be student led-crafting for charity, teambuilding, teacher/student games

#### **Budget Summary**

- □ The District's current adopted budget contains total appropriations of \$ 36,295,407
- □ The 2019-2020 proposed budget contains total appropriations of \$36,900,454.
- ☐ Thus, the proposed budget is \$605,047 or 1.67% more than the prior year.

The most significant increases?

- □ Special Education increase is \$167,766 to support students with disabilities
- □ Health insurance increase is \$337,063 as health rates increased
- □ Student Transportation –increase is \$144,199 to provide transportation to students


- □ The 1.67% increase in the budget, then increases the tax levy by 1.90%.
- □ The difference in budget and tax levy increase is caused by aid provided by NYS.
- □ Exact tax rates for each town are not known until assessment rolls are finalized.


- □ While New York State provided significant aid increases for most school districts, our district was left in the cold.
- □ The District's aid increased by only \$12,339 or .08%.
- □ Despite this minuscule aid increase, the District's average tax levy increase for the past seven years is .48%.


# How are the education dollars spent?





# Cheektowaga-Sloan UFSD Health Insurance


#### Annual Percentage Increase in Cost



The cumulative increase over this ten year period is approximately 66% – or an average increase of approximately 6.6% per year.


#### Cheektowaga-Sloan UFSD New York State Teachers' Retirement System

#### Required Employer Contribution Rate




# Cheektowaga-Sloan UFSD New York State Employees Retirement System

# What actions has the District taken to control costs?

- What has the District done to control costs?
  - > Implemented Shared Business Manager model
  - > Eliminated 19 positions in past 5 years
  - Partnered with BOCES for management of all computer operations
  - Consolidate purchasing of supplies, materials, computers, copiers, various food supplies with other Districts to obtain quantity discounts
  - Switched dental coverage to lower cost provider

- What has the District done to control costs?
  - > Implemented a print management project
  - Implemented a power-off system for computers
  - Refinanced District bond issuances
  - Building & Grounds savings in vehicle replacement and gasoline monitoring
  - Began process of changing to LED lighting systems to reduce electrical usage

- What has the District done in this budget control costs?
  - There are 6 teachers that are (or have) retired during the 2018-19 fiscal year.
  - > Three will not be replaced
  - We continually review student enrollment to determine staffing needs—fiscal responsibility

#### ■ What has the District done to control costs?

District Leadership—maintain administrative costs at a very low level as a result of the following:

- Superintendent serves as chief operating officer, personnel director and assumes many other roles
- There are no deputy, assistant or associate superintendents of instruction, human resources, or buildings and grounds
- ❖ Part-time Business Official--2.5 days per week
- All administrators take on additional tasks as needed

**■ What has the District done to control costs?** 

These initiatives save in excess

of \$1.9 million annually

How did we advocate for the District in order to express our specific concerns and needs?

- What has been done to secure our fair share of State assistance?
  - ➤ January 2019—Superintendent outlined and submitted legislative priorities to ECASB
  - February 8, 2019—Superintendent personally met with Assemblywoman Monica Wallace
  - ➤ March 11, 2019—Superintendent arranged & hosted a joint Cheektowaga District call with Senator Timothy Kennedy
  - March 27, 2019—we sent a letter to Senator Kennedy's Policy Director to be used in budget negotiations—outlined our biggest fiscal challenges

#### **□ District Advocacy (Continued)**

- Discussed \$35,983,538 loss of Foundation Aid due to State not following formula
- Discussed current and continuing mandates that add additional costs to taxpayers
- Discussed specific student needs and desire to provide the best education possible
- Board participated in ECSBA's advocacy efforts

#### **□** District Advocacy (Continued)

- Despite all of these efforts the District received virtually no increase in State aid
- We are extremely disappointed in this outcome
- We have and will continue to follow-up with our legislators to express our dissatisfaction with the little aid we received and to fight for what is fair and deserving for our Community

The proposed budget remains very lean, but:

- ■We will maintain all student educational programs you heard about this evening which are focused on 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learning
- ■We will maintain art, music, physical education, foreign language, librarians at each school, clubs and sports at current levels

The proposed budget remains very lean, but:

- □Student health and building safety remains our number one priority (installed panic buttons, updated AED machines, training for allergy awareness, maintained school nurses, etc.)
- □All buildings will be appropriately maintained (many capital improvements have occurred with more improvements planned for this summer 2019)
- □We have not mortgaged the future with this budget

### Focus Continues to be on Improving Educational Opportunities for *All* Students

- Continued work with our successful Lucy Calkins Reading/Writing Workshop implementation K-5
- Continued focus on The 7 Habits/Leader in Me Program in all schools—possible Lighthouse School recognition coming soon
- □ Continued work on the Master Schedule at JFK MS & HS which will result in effective changes, such as advisement periods for students to concentrate on the importance of mindfulness, leadership, and social/emotional needs

#### Improving Educational Opportunities for All Students:

- □ Significant investment in **new textbooks/resources** to support curriculum revision
- Continued work on strengthening our math programs/instruction, and continued expansion of classroom reading workshop libraries
- Continued focus on our Academic Learning Centers and how we can use them to make even greater change with improved student success
- □ Continued **investment in technology** with upgrades to wireless data points, digital photo labs, robotics/3D printing, innovative Promethean Boards, chromebooks

The District's proposed budget contains a tax levy increase of
